Church Banister Update





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From the Worship Committee

Thank you to everyone who helped to take down the Christmas decorations. This church is filled with amazing people who are always there to do what needs to be done. What a blessing!

Our "Show and Tell" worship service was great. Everyone brought an object that held special meaning to them, and it was interesting to hear their stories. We'll do this again.

Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent, named for the custom of a priest's making a cross from the ashes of the previous year's burned Palm Sunday fronds on the foreheads of believers. It was first observed in the sixth century, during the papacy of Gregory the Great. It used to be thought that bathing in ashes would remove all traces of past transgressions. Romans bathed in ashes at their New Year festival of atonement in the month of March. Christians adopted this practice.

Lent is the forty-day period, excluding Sundays, prior to Easter, and it is a period of penitential preparation for Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday. It was first observed in the fourth century; however, the forty-day time frame did not become official until the eighth century. The word "Lent" comes from the Indo-European *langat-tin*, "long day," referring to the lengthening days of spring. The period before Easter was already being used for fasting, confession, and educating candidates for baptism on Easter Eve.

The number forty carries much religious significance. Jesus fasted for forty days in the desert after his baptism and before beginning his public ministry, Moses and Elias spent forty days in the wilderness, the Jews wandered forty years in search of the Promised Land, Jonah gave the city of Ninevah forty days' grace in which to repent, and Noah's flood lasted forty days and nights.

The determination of the fast was left up to each group of Christians. Some ate no meat, others ate no milk or eggs, and still others ate only one light meal each day. Today, fasting is usually a "token fast," such as giving up chocolate or chewing gum.

During Lent, many churches cover the crosses in their sanctuaries with a veil, which is removed just before the Easter service. Also, some churches have their parishioners write the word "alleluia" on a piece of paper. The papers are gathered, put into a box, and buried, to be dug up again on Easter morning, the most joyous day of the church year.

Valentine's Day began as the Roman Catholic Church's attempt to supersede a pagan holiday. As early as the fourth century B.C., Romans held an annual young man's rite of passage in honor of the god Lupercus. The names of teenaged females were placed in a box and were drawn by young men, so a man was thus assigned his woman companion for the ensuing year. During the year, the two engaged in sexual activity. At the end of the year, another celebration was held and new names were drawn. Church fathers decided that this celebration needed to be done away with, and they chose Valentine, who had been martyred two hundred years earlier, as their focus of a new celebration.

In A.D. 270, in Rome, Valentine got in trouble with the crazy emperor Claudius II, who had issued a decree forbidding marriage, because married men made bad soldiers, choosing to remain with their families rather than going to battle. Valentine, bishop of Interamna, told young couples who wanted to marry to come to him, and he officiated at the ceremony. Valentine became known as the "friend of lovers." Claudius instructed him to convert to worshipping Roman gods, which Valentine refused to do, so on February 24, 270, he was clubbed, stoned, and then beheaded. While he was in prison, awaiting execution, he fell in love with the jailer's blind daughter, and he miraculously restored her sight. He signed a farewell message to her, "From Your Valentine," a phrase that lives to this day. In A.D. 496, Pope Gelasius outlawed the Lupercian festival. He kept the box for the names, however, although in it were placed slips of paper containing the names of saints. Men and women drew names from the box and were expected, during the ensuing year, to emulate the saint whose name they draw. Some young men were, undoubtedly, disappointed by the change.
